MAKE YOUR WRITING MORE APPETIZING WITH THE QUOTE SANDWICH

INTRODUCE IT
YOUR TOP PIECE OF BREAD IS YOUR INTRODUCTION. BEFORE ADDING IN YOUR QUOTATION, INTRODUCE IT.

On page 32 Twain states,

QUOTE IT
YOUR QUOTATION IS THE FILLING OF YOUR SANDWICH. AFTER YOUR INTRODUCTION, ADD YOUR QUOTATION.

**WHAT DO YOU THINK IT MEANS?
HOW DOES IT SUPPORT YOUR THESIS?**

FOR EXAMPLE

According to Plato, "Wise men talk because they have something to say; fools because they have to say something." Plato's point is that people should always think before they speak. This is important to remember when communicating in any situation, whether talking to parents or chatting with peers, as speaking without thinking can lead to saying something one does not mean or will regret.

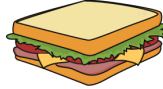

EXAMPLE QUOTE SANDWICH

DECONSTRUCTING THE SANDWICH

Top Piece of Bread (Introduction): According to Albert Einstein,

Introduction Breakdown: The introductory phrase before the quotation helps the reader understand your evidence by explaining who or where it comes from; in this case, the source is Albert Einstein.

Filling (Quotation): “The important thing is not to stop questioning. Curiosity has its own reason for existing” (3).

Quotation Breakdown: The quotation is placed immediately after the introductory phrase, and it is placed in quotation marks. The number three in parentheses (3) after the quotation tells the reader that this line came from page three of the text that the writer is citing. This style of documenting page numbers is particular to the Modern Language Association (MLA), which is a commonly used style guide.

Bottom Piece of Bread (Explanation): In saying this, Einstein encourages people to embrace curiosity as mindset. The importance of curiosity can be seen in such inventions as the light bulb or the telephone. Without curiosity, these discoveries would not exist, and humans would certainly not have the modern conveniences that make life more comfortable today.

Explanation Breakdown: The explanation of the quotation should explain what the writer thinks it means and/or how it connects to the larger thesis (main idea). In this case, the explanation clarifies Einstein’s meaning and elaborates on how curiosity is important when it comes to creating inventions.
